We've been busy at the Cue Community Resource Centre again for May.

We held another sausage sizzle at the tourist park and even had a visitor of the park play some live music for us, which was awesome.

The Cue CRC hosted Australia's Biggest Morning tea on the 27th of May and raised over \$700, our aim was \$1000 and although we didn't raise as mush as we would have liked, we still raised more than our last Biggest Morning Tea. The Cue CRC would like to thank those who donated cakes and to everyone who attended, great effort in helping the CRC raise much needed funds for the Biggest Morning Tea.

The CRC hosted the first Sunday Markets of the year and we were happy with the turn out, a huge amount of people came. We had a sausage sizzle provided by the Cue Volunteer Fire Brigade (awesome job firies!),gorgeous jewellery, handmade products, house hold items and a few home made cakes. Unfortunately due to the weather, we didn't have as many stalls as we had planned, but it was still a great Sunday morning market day.

In June we have Walking Group every Monday evening, Craft Group every Wednesday morning. Department of Transport will be at the CRC on Monday 14th June, we will have Sunday Markets again this month on the 27th June, we also have an Open Day for the Cue Heritage Discovery Centre on the 17th June. FROM THE CEO

A few nice showers of rain across the Shire in recent weeks will hopefully bring some benefits to pastoralists and increase the potential for an impressive wildflower display for our visitors. In the town centre, we recorded a total of 52mm over two events, which is unusual for this time of year. To some, that may not sound like a lot, but in this area it is enough to make many of our roads hazardous. Take care when travelling, particularly at flood crossings. Do not ignore closed road signs, as damage caused to the road surface when it is sloppy will create a much bigger problem for everyone after it dries.

A number of Shire roads are still waiting on repairs to damage from a rain event in 2020 which was declared a natural disaster. Unfortunately, the rules of the federal assistance we receive to respond to such events, prevents the Shire from doing anything more than making the road passable until a lengthy assessment process is completed. Lacy Bros have now been engaged to repair the affected roads and are progressively working their way through their program. Please obey all traffic control signs when passing through roadworks.

Later this month, Axiis Contracting will be commencing work on the next projects in the Shire's shared use pathway program. Current pathways on Dowley and Allen Streets will be extended to complete a loop and a short section will be constructed on Austin Street to complete the pathway to Patterson Street. New paths will be constructed on Stewart and Chesson Streets. As the paths are intended for both walking and cycling, benches and bicycle racks will also be installed at focal points on the pathway.

After negotiating quarantine and licensing requirements, the Shire's recently acquired patching truck is now in full operation maintaining the seal on Beringarra-Cue Road. Keep an eye out for this machine when travelling on the road as it will be moving at very low speeds and stopping frequently.

The Shire's annual event to thank the many volunteers who help to make our community a better place was held on the evening of Saturday 22 May. Emmet's performance showed off his huge range of musical genres, while volunteers enjoyed the meal and refreshments. This is the first time we have held this event to coincide with National Volunteer Week. Unfortunately, this also meant that many of the volunteers were involved in other volunteer functions and were unable to attend. The future timing of this event will be reviewed.

Council has resolved to make an annual contribution of \$50,000 to the Cue Community Resource Centre to assist with employing more staff for the Tourist Information Centre. This will enable the facility to extend their opening hours during tourist season.

Auditing firm, Butler Settineri, recently spent a week in the office conducting the Shire's interim audit on behalf of the Office of the Auditor General. This will be followed up by the annual audit following the end of the financial year. During the audit entry interview with the OAG's representative, the Shire stressed it's view that the timeframe for the audit process needs to be shorter to allow for timely presentation of the annual report.

One of the things I've learned in my time in Cue is that it can throw up some surprises. One of the more unusual is being chosen as the location for an event called Pox-Eclipse. Billed as Australia's first major Wastelander event, Pox-Eclipse will present an opportunity for participants to immerse themselves in a post-apocalyptic themed camping experience based on the Mad Max film series. Organisers are hoping to run the event annually, with a target of attracting 500 people to the inaugural event, which will be held from 26-29 August.

It is now officially winter, so it might be too cold to actually go barefoot, but casual bowls is back on, starting at 1pm on Sundays. There are plenty of sets of bowls available to use and new players are welcome.

By the time the July edition of this publication is produced, I will be settled back home in Tasmania, most likely in a thick wool jumper. In my final contribution, I will reflect on some of the Shire's achievements during my time as CEO, such as the redevelopment of the old post office building and the construction of the Oasis Tourist Stop, bowling green and small wheels park. While the Shire's campaign to get the State Government to commit to upgrading the water treatment plant to improve our water quality was successful, commissioning of the plant is several months away, so I will unfortunately miss the fanfare and the opportunity to taste the best water in Australia.

The selection process for my replacement is progressing, with the position attracting 14 applicants who are currently being assessed by the CEO Selection Panel. An appointment of the Shire's new CEO is expected to be made within weeks.

First aid fact sheet Snake bite



All known or suspected snake bites must be treated as potentially lifethreatening, and medical aid should be sought urgently.

Signs and symptoms

Signs of a snake bite are not always visible. In some cases, the patient may not have felt anything. Symptoms may not appear for an hour or more after the person has been bitten.

Depending on the type of snake, signs and symptoms may include some or all of the following:

- immediate or delayed pain at the bite site
- swelling, bruising or local bleeding
- bite marks (usually on a limb) that may vary from obvious puncture wounds to scratches that may be almost invisible
- swollen and tender glands in the groin or armpit of the bitten limb
- faintness, dizziness
- nausea and vomiting
- headache
- abdominal pain
- oozing of blood from the bite site or gums
- double or blurred vision
- drooping eyelids
- difficulty in speaking or swallowing
- limb weakness or paralysis
- difficulty in breathing
- occasionally, initial collapse or confusion followed by partial or complete recovery.

What to do

Pressure bandage & immobilise

- Follow DRSABCD.
- 2 Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3 Lie the patient down and ask them to keep still. Reassure the patient.
- 4 If on a limb, apply an elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide) over the bite site as soon as possible.
- 5 Apply a further elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide), starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached.
 - Use clothing or other material if an elasticised roller bandage is not available.
 - Apply the bandage as firmly as possible to the limb. You should be unable to easily slide a finger between the bandage and the skin.
- 6 Immobilise the bandaged limb using splints.
- 7 Keep the patient lying down and completely still (immobilised).
- 8 Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. If possible, mark the location of the bite site (if known) on the skin with a pen, or photograph the site. Do not wash venom off the skin or clothes because it may assist identification.
- 9 Stay with the patient until medical aid arrives.
