FROM THE CEO

The month of April represents the start of the busy season for Cue with an increase in visitors, travelers and prospectors into the region. A big welcome or welcome back to Cue for all our visitors, we hope you enjoy your time here and enjoy everything Cue has to offer.

The ANZAC Day memorial service will be held on Sunday 25 April from 5.45am at Arthur Stanley Memorial Park. This will be followed by breakfast at the Queen of the Murchison.

Over sixty people attended the Splash Test Dummies who performed at the Town Hall on Wednesday 3 March 2021. The Shire provided beef and gravy rolls and salad for dinner and the audience enjoyed a show of slap stick comedy, juggling and circus theatrics that revolved around water. There was good crowd participation with people young and old joining in or jumping out of their seat to avoid the antics of the performers.



The Cue Community Resource Centre hosted a bingo night on Saturday 20 March and raised over four hundred dollars for the Youth Centre. I would like to thank all those involved for a great night of fun especially Ian Dennis for being the impromptu caller on the night, it was very entertaining. There were great prizes given away to the winners and it is anticipated that more bingo nights will be held over the coming months, I hope you can join us.

The Townsite resurfacing program was brought forward due to Downer EDI experiencing a hold up on another job so were available to start our program ahead of schedule. This made for a busy week preparing the road surfaces for the slurry seal which provides a much smoother surface to drive on. All of the Streets on the West side of the Highway within the townsite of Cue have been completed. Works will resume on 6 April following the Easter break to complete the rest of the townsite. Please be aware that line marking works has not been completed on the town streets following these works so please take extra care when driving within the townsite.

Construction works to install turning nodes to each end of the Cue Aerodrome are expected to be completed in early April with only the sealing works left to be undertaken. The turning nodes will allow larger planes to utilise the aerodrome to accommodate the transport needs for Westgold's workforce.

Sealing works on the Wilgie Mia Road have now been completed to allow for the heavy vehicles carting ore from the Fenix Resources Iron Ridge Mine. This has also increased heavy traffic on the Beringarra-Cue Road which is undergoing maintenance and resealing works over the coming months. Road users are advised to take care and drive to the road conditions.

Restoration works to the Old Railway building are nearing completion with the building expected to be ready for use as the Youth Centre in the coming months. The Old Gaol and Bank of New South Wales buildings are also undergoing restoration works to preserve the buildings and repurpose them for future enjoyment and use.

The final audit report for the 2019 – 2020 financial year was received by the Office of the Auditor General on 12 February 2021. The Shire of Cue 2019-2020 Annual Report was adopted at the March ordinary meeting of Council and is available in the public documents section on the Shire's website. The date for the Annual Electors Meeting has been set for Tuesday 13 April 2021, at 6.30pm, to be held in the Council Chambers at 73 Austin St Cue.



Local Lads at Gallipoli

Amongst the many names honoured on the Cue-Day Dawn District Volunteer Board located in the vestibule of the old Municipal Chambers, are 14 lads who served for King and Country as part of the first landings at Gallipoli of 25th April, 1915.

On the 29th August, 1914, the Murchison Times and Day Dawn Gazette wrote under the heading of Volunteers for the Empire, "The following young men left Cue and Day Dawn on Friday morning to go into camp with WA's quota to the Australia Expeditionary Forces :- Cue.- Percy Donegan and Daniel Cocking. Day Dawn.- Robert Bray, Arthur Myers, Andrew Denton, Leslie Whiting, Timothy Shea, George Reid, Stephen Tatte, Norman Macleod, James Milligan and Peter Williamson. Much enthusiasm was displayed." Flynn & Scott had already left by the 18th, with the remainders leaving sometime after.

By the 10th September, most of the lads had already begun their basic training at Blackboy Hill, located in the hills to the East of Midland. Donegan & Flynn shipped out on the 26th October (presumably with Scott), with Cocking, Nevett, Shea, Williamson all departing on the 2nd Nov. Tregurtha & Twomey were the last to leave on the 15th Feb, and were obviously straight into the action on their arrival. The majority were taken on strength into the 11th Battalion, with Donegan, Twomey & Williamson going the 12th Battalion; with Clues & Reid joining the

Sadly, three of the boys were killed as a result of action during the campaign. Sgt William Nevett was shot & killed in one of the landing boats before he got the chance to set foot on enemy territory. Nevett was educated at Birmingham University before securing work as Assistant Engineer to the Miners' Water Supply in Perth. He was soon assigned to Cue Water Board where he also pursued voluntary work at the St John's Church. He enlisted as soon as his position could be filled, leaving for Blackboy Hill to enlist on the 14th Sept., and sailing to Egypt on the Troop Ship "Medic" along with Williamson. During his training in Egypt, he declined the offer of a commission preferring to stay with his commades. His Septembre Major wrete of his death to his sister stating commission preferring to stay with his comrades. His Sergeant Major wrote of his death to his sister stating "Nevett was on the left flank on the Sunday we effected a landing here, and at this point the fighting was particularly heavy. Your brother was hit in the firing line, and was carried to a place of more safety by Private Michie, another of our good men since killed. The wound was so serious that before the stretcher bearers could get him to the beach, he died. He was one of our most efficient and popular N.C.O's and my best friend." As a testament to the impression he made in the short time to the town of Cue and Day Dawn, a tablet was commissioned in his honour. The Murchison Times & Day Dawn Gazette wrote on the 19th July, 1918 "The tablet, which was erected through the efforts of Warden Walter of Kalgoorlie, and friends of Cue, is set in the middle of the south wall of the church. It is of brass and set in a fine piece of coloured marble. The design is of ivy leaves with crowns in the corners and the badge of the Commonwealth military forces at the top. The inscription is as follows:- "In loving memory of William Percy Nevett, B.E., vestryman of Cue-Day Dawn Parish, Sergeant 12th Battalion, A.I.F.; killed at Gallipoli 25th April, 1915. The tablet is erected by sorrowing relatives and friends".

Ironically, Nevett's sailing buddy, Peter Williamson, was another lad who died, succumbing to a septic compound fracture to his leg & arm on a hospital ship in August, and was buried at sea. He left Edinburgh for Australia and soon volunteered at the outbreak of war, and leaving for Egypt with the main force. His personal inventory of 2 Testaments, knife, diary and a shaving brush were sent to his surviving mother living in the Shetland Islands.



The lads who served during the Gallipoli campaign certainly made an impact. Private Speedwell Tregurtha wrote to Mr. W.H. Diggins, who was the Chairman of the Roads Board at the time of the departure of all of the lads. "Am letting you have this line from one who enlisted at Day Dawn, so that you will be able to let the towns people know that Day Dawn lads are holding up their bit of the stick. I was with the 10 who left Day Dawn on the 16th November last, and wish, with others, to thank you for the well-chosen words of advice you gave us. Bert Pain was wounded in the stomach, and I think Bob Bray was also wounded, but am not sure. Carter and Harry Reid were alright when I saw them last. Young Sharpe was doing well also. Things were fairly lively on landing and the 11th West Australians made a great name for themselves the first Sunday night. They were the first landing party and had to be taken over in rowing boats under heavy fire. In jumping over some of our lads went over their heads in the water. I did not land until two days after, but saw plenty to do. Am writing this laying down in hospital at Alexandria with a compound fracture of the thigh, so you will excuse short note." On the 18th June, Tregurtha was sent to England to recuperate, however he unfortunately succumbed to those injuries on the 22nd of August.

Private Dan Cocking wrote to his family from Gallipoli in early June:- "Just a line to let you know I am still alive and well. We landed here on 26th April, at 4 a.m. The Turks were in the trenches on the hills here, but they left when they heard the language used against them when we landed. The air was blue for a time. We are entrenched on the hills now, and they have got to shift us out before we leave. Bob Bray was wounded about the 2nd May. I have not heard how he is getting on. He was not hurt badly, so he is probably back again by this time. George Boland and E. Flynn are alright and wish to be remembered to all Cue friends. I will write more later on." Dan obviously put the skills honed at the Cue Rifle Club to best use, as mentioned by Frank Chapman in a letter "Private Dan Cocking is considered a crack sniper of his regiment and when you hear his rifle go, you can bet your life a Turk had gone out." Dan was another who declined offers of stripes and an officer's commission in recognition of his contributions.

Unfortunately, news of Dan's death on the 30th May 1916 whilst fighting in France reached Cue-Day Dawn. The Murchison Times reported on 23rd June:- "The deceased who was 30 years of age, was with J Flynn, one the (sic) first to offer their services for Australia and the Empire from this district. He was at the historical landing in Gallipoli, and went right through the campaign. He was slightly wounded three or four times, but would not leave the trenches, until he was ordered away on sick leave which he put in on Lemnos Island. Private Cocking was then given the choice of returning to Australia on long furlough or to England, but he preferred to go on fighting and went to France."

Another to lose his life in France after surviving the Gallipoli campaign, was Hubert Clues. Corporal Clues lost his life at the famous battle of Bullecourt in France on 11th April, 1917, receiving a GSW above the heart & passing away peacefully. He was wounded at Gallipoli in the early days of the landing, receiving GSW to his right thigh. I'm sure he would have had an interesting tale to tell of the nearby scar during treatment. As an 18 y.o., he was involved in an unfortunate accident at the Butchers of Mr J J Ryan in Geraldton, when he fell from the carcass hanging frame and was pierced right through the buttock by a meat hook, leaving him suspended for a time until released

None of the lads would have returned unscathed from their time serving. Physical injuries were numerous, and besides those already mentioned, others were Cpl. Scott who received a shrapnel wound in the neck on the 2nd day, and Pte. Witnish who sustained GSW to the jaw on the 1st day. Pte. Twomey received a severe GSW to the neck at Gallipoli in August and was eventually repatriated back to Australia and medically discharged. Pte. Shea was also wounded on the 1st day, receiving GSWs to scalp, calf & shoulder. Further GSWs to right eye & chest on the 29th July saw him being repatriated back to Australia. Pte. Reid received GSWs to back & left buttocks on the 3rd May.

The previously mentioned letter from Pte. Tregurtha referred to Bob Bray being possibly injured. Prior to enlisting, Bob was part of the Day Dawn Volunteer Fire Brigade that won the 1912 WAFBA Championships. Bob signed up on the 31st October, sailing for Gallipoli on the "Themistocles" on the 22nd December with the 11th Battalion. Pte. Bray stopped 2 bullets at Gallipoli, the first to his L. shoulder on 7th May, then again in August in his left hand. Ultimately, he stopped another 3 bullets in France, the last necessitating the amputation of his left leg and eventual repatriation back to Australia. The many months recuperating in hospital in England led to him marrying a nurse there, who he intended to bring back to Australia when she was able to be released.

Seemingly, only Boland and Flynn returned physically unscathed, but it is fair to assume that they all came back with mental scars from their experiences and ordeals. PTSD is only a recent label attached to these real difficulties the lads would have returned home with. There are many instances of alcoholism, marital problems, and various brushes with the law appearing in newspaper articles I have located whilst doing my research of the names honoured on the board. The ultimate price for serving King and Country came in many forms.

Note – You may have noted names quoted in various transcripts above that are not listed. I have found many instances of names that were not included on the Honour Board for whatever reason. Also, spelling errors are adding to the difficulty of linking specific records to names listed, so it is entirely possible there were many more names yet to be added to those who participated in the original landing. Researching the names is very much a work in progress, and I welcome any input that can be provided in filling gaps in the story, for instance whatever happened to the Church and/or plaque as mentioned above.



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To the residents of Regional West Australia

The last four years of my life have been the most exciting and incredible time in my life. To be elected to represent the people of the mining and pastoral electorate was a great honour.

Unfortunately, I have been unsuccessful in my bid to get re-elected on the 13th March and sadly must bow out of the role. I will never be able to re-pay the people who gave me the help and encouragement to pursue the main issues facing Regional WA.

I feel that my role as a cross bencher in the upper house, was important in deciding on many of the various topics being voted on in the chamber.

The mining and pastoral electorate is one of the biggest electorates in the world, taking up 2.2 million square kilometres. From Norseman to Kaluburu and everywhere in between makes up this diverse electorate. I have always believed that the regions are the financial backbone of West Australia. The mining industries are the blue-chip incomes for the state and federal governments and having spent more than three decades in mining I know just how dependant our politicians are in this huge industry. The mining industry has the finances and the clout to climb over all the hurdles that the state government puts in front of them, sometimes they may have to wait for the bureaucrats to rubber stamp their applications but, in the end, they get their wishes granted.

The pastoral and agriculture industries do not have the same clout and sadly we have huge areas that are not being utilised to create wealth and more importantly jobs for our young people who are living in our regional towns. Billions of litres of water flow from the Fitzroy River into the ocean each year and not one litre of this is used to grow industry or create one single job.

We have people making decisions in Parliament who have only lived in the metropolitan bubble and have no real knowledge of regional WA. This is a battle that has to be won by the pastoral, agricultural and mining industries to secure the future of WA and its residents. All of these industries rely on a water supply for their future, and there is an abundance of water in the north just waiting to be used.

Again, I thank the residents of my electorate for their support over the last four years. Take care and never give up the fight for regional Western Australia.



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


