FROM THE CEO

As the tourist season starts to wind down we wish to thank all the Tourists who have taken the time to stop and visit our town. The feedback we have received at the Shire has been very positive and we hope to see you again. I also wish to thank all our Cue volunteers. Your contribution to our town is invaluable.

I will be attending the Local Government Convention in Perth from the 1 – 4 October and taking annual leave. Glenn Boyes will be Acting CEO whilst I am on annual leave.

We submitted a 30 second film about Cue into the WALGA Showcase in Pixels competition. It is currently, along with other state wide entries, being displayed in Yagan Square in Perth. The winner of the competition will be announced at the Local Government Convention.

Evan Ayers played at the Murchison Club Hotel on Saturday 17 September. It was well attended and everyone really enjoyed the show. A big thank you to the Cue Community Resource Centre for organising this event and the Murchison Club Hotel for providing a great venue.

The railway building is nearing completion with the paving now completed and the final works for the inside of the building underway. There are still works to be completed outside with bollards, garden and driveway to be done. The date has been decided for the opening of the building and reinstating the youth program. The Shire will host a Halloween themed evening for the kids on 28 October 2022 and [a Grand Opening Op Shop Fancy Dress event](#) for the community on the 29 October 2022. More details are in this issue of the Dryblower.

On the subject of the Railway building it is very disappointing to see the damage already done to this almost completed project by the senseless vandalism that has been done to the building. Smashed windows, rocks thrown at the walls and graffiti on a building being repurposed as a youth centre. Yet it seems the youth are determined to destroy it before it is completed for their benefit. It is not only the railway building suffering from this spree and seems to have only cropped up over the past month.

Mosquitos are starting to present themselves again and the Shire of Cue will undertake fogging operations when weather conditions allow. Residents are asked to check their properties and remove any potential mosquito breeding areas, by emptying containers holding water, ensuring gutters are not holding water and checking yards for areas that hold water.

I have been informed of a number of snake sightings in and around town, which means they are out of hibernation and active again. Please use caution when out walking. Keeping grass short and cleaning up around the yard will help to keep them away.

Some Shire roads are still awaiting repairs following damage caused by a rain event in late March. Road users are asked to take care when travelling, particularly at flood crossings. Please drive to the road conditions and observe any traffic directions.

Roadworks are ongoing 1km south of town on the Great Northern Highway. It is expected that these will be completed in the coming weeks. Westgold are modifying and improving the intersection where the Miners Pass Road meets the highway. Traffic management and reduced speed limits are in place. Travellers can expect minor delays.

The Murdoch University Vet Program will be returning to Cue on Monday October 17. Students from the university will be providing free pet checks and sterilisation under the guidance of a senior vet. Other services available include microchipping and vaccination at the owner's expense. Please note that this service is provided by the Shire of Cue and can only be provided to dogs and cats registered with the Shire. Bookings are essential and can be made through the Shire office.

Dog owners are reminded of their obligations to keep their dogs contained within the boundaries of their property or on a leash while walking. Please be considerate of others as it can be quite confronting to be approached by an unknown dog while out walking. The Shire Ranger visits the area frequently and will take action against unrestrained dogs in public places. This may result in a financial penalty to the owner and potential destruction of offending animals. The only authorised area within the town-site where dogs are permitted to be exercised off-leash is the town oval. It is your responsibility to control and look after your pets.





Halloween Biscuits

Try them if you dare!

INGREDIENTS

3 cups icing sugar
1/4 cup hot water
20g butter
orange food colouring
250g plain biscuits
melted chocolate
lollies to decorate
drinking chocolate
coloured sprinkles

METHOD

1. Sift icing sugar into a large bowl. Place water and butter into a jug and stir until butter melts. pour butter mixture into icing sugar, stirring to combine.
2. Add food colouring to mixture, 1 drop at a time, stirring constantly, until you have desired colour.
3. using a butter knife, spread melted chocolate or icing over biscuits.
4. Decorate biscuits with leftover melted chocolate, lollies, drinking chocolate and coloured sprinkles.



Your local government invites you to nominate an outstanding individual or group for one of this year's Community Citizen of the Year Awards to be presented on Australia Day 26 January. The awards foster, recognise and celebrate significant contributions to community life and active citizenship in all local government areas of Western Australia. His Excellency the Governor of Western Australia is the Patron and signatory for the awards.

Guidelines and criteria

Each year three local citizens and one local community group in each local government area will be eligible for the Community Citizen of the Year Awards. The recipients will be selected from people and groups who have made a noteworthy contribution during the current year or given outstanding service to the local community over a number of years through active involvement.

Auspire - Australia Day Council WA provides four awards each year for presentation in each local government area. These prestigious awards are provided to your local government for presentation during Australia Day celebrations.

Nomination Process

Your local government invites nominations for the awards from community groups and private citizens. At the council's discretion, a committee comprised of people from community organisations and citizens, will be appointed to encourage and promote nominations. The committee or your local council may also make nominations based on local knowledge and experience.

Nominations open on 1 September and close on 31 October and can be received in hard copy on the original nomination form or online at www.citizenshipawards.com.au.

Nominations received after the closing date will be ineligible for this year's awards.

Selection Criteria

The winners will have been judged to have shown active citizenship and:

- Significant contribution to the local community.
- Demonstrated leadership on a community issue resulting in the enhancement of community life.
- A significant initiative which has brought about positive change and added value to community life.
- Inspiring qualities as a role model for the community.

Eligibility criteria

- Nominees should reside or work principally within the local authority making the award.
- Awards may be granted posthumously in recognition of recent achievements.
- Groups of people or couples will not normally be eligible except when meeting the criteria for a community group.
- A person may receive an award on more than one occasion in recognition of their particularly outstanding community contribution or involvement in an alternative initiative.
- Unsuccessful nominees may be nominated in future years.
- Nominations must be apolitical in their nature and should not in any way bring the awards program or local government area into disrepute.
- Sitting members of State, Federal and Local Government are not eligible.
