FROM THE DESK OF THE CEO

The 2018 Cue Darts Competition was held on Saturday 22 September. The Shire donated medals to be presented to team members of the winners and runners up.

The next meeting of Cue Parliament will be held on Friday 2 November. Members of the Murchison Zone of the WA Local Government Association will gather to discuss topics relevant to the Murchison region and Local Government generally. A number of prominent State Government representatives are expected to attend.

Westgold have moved into the old Municipal building in Robinson Street and are utilising the area for their administration office.

Council is currently considering allowing the construction of a mine camp at Big Bell. This would be a departure from current policy, which does not support the construction of workforce accommodation outside the town site within 70 kilometres of Cue.

Preparations are almost complete for the resurfacing of the remainder of the Beringarra-Cue road to the Shire's Western boundary. It is hoped that sealing will be completed by December 2018, finalising this project. At the completion of the works, it is estimated that the Beringarra-Cue Road Reserve will contain approximately 2.8 million dollars for future maintenance of this road. Following completion of the Beringarra-Cue Road, the Shire workforce will then proceed to the Beebyn-Karbar Road to continue works on the flood damage funded by the WA Natural Disaster Relief & Recovery Arrangements.

Rate notices have been distributed. If you haven't received yours yet, please contact the Shire office. The Shire is again offering the chance to win a rates incentive prize to ratepayers who pay their rates in full by 5 October 2018. Eligible entries will go into the draw for the opportunity to receive a \$600 first prize, with \$300 for second and \$100 for third.

The Shire of Cue will be conducting a roadside verge collection on Monday 15 October within the Cue town site. Please take this opportunity to remove any unwanted and loose items from your property ahead of the storm season. Larger items can be collected by contacting the Manager of Works and Services to make arrangements.

Finding Breast Cancer Early

October is breast cancer awareness month. Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in WA women, who have a 1 in 10 chance of being diagnosed by age 75. Men can also get breast cancer although it is rare.

Throughout regional WA, the *Find Cancer Early* program is urging people to pay attention to changes in their body and if they notice anything unusual, to tell their doctor.

What are the common symptoms of breast cancer?

- New persistent pain or discomfort
- A change in shape, size or feel of your breasts
- Any lump or lumpiness or thickening of the breast or under your arm
- Changes in the skin such as puckering, redness or dimpling of the breast
- Any change in nipple position or nipple discharge

If you have had any of these symptoms, tell your doctor. It doesn't mean you've got breast cancer, but it's important to tell your doctor and get checked.

Remember, if it is breast cancer, the earlier it's found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.

Thanks to research and advances in early detection, screening and prevention, more than 90 per cent of women with breast cancer are still alive 5 years after diagnosis.

How you can check your breasts

Take the time to become breast aware; in the shower, when getting dressed, looking in the mirror, putting on body lotion, lying down in bed and feel your breasts, this helps you know what is normal for you, so you can notice any changes.

- Remember to feel all the breast tissue, from the collarbone to below the bra-line and under the armpit.
- Use the flat part of your fingers and finger pads to feel near the surface and deeper in the breast.

Following Their Ancestors Footsteps....

The Passaris Family

This month the descendants of the Passaris Family travelled from all over Australia to come together and follow the footsteps of their ancestors through the Murchison.

The family headed to Cue on the 17th of September and arrived at the Community Resource Centre—bringing with them the story of their Greek ancestors' connection to Cue, and to the island of Castellorizo.

Jack Passaris arrived in WA with his uncle Kyriakos sometime between 1895 and 1897. They headed for the Murchison, and Cue became their destination. While working in the gold mines, they also ran a successful store at Cue, and in the mid 1900's Jack brought two of his brothers over from Castellorizo. They stayed in the area for 30 years.

The Passaris Family have kindly donated a framed copy of the image below, showing Jack Passaris in the bottom left leaning back next to the picnic basket—the picture is believed to have been taken in Cue.

The family have also kindly donated a book about the Castellorizian connection to Western Australia, including the Murchison and Cue. This book is available for reading at the Cue Public Library.

Cue Hero Rider Breaks Record!

He was a Cue local living here in our beautiful historic town, he arrived in 1892 with a dream to achieve and a record to break. Paddy O'Dea, His main goal and set determination was to bicycle across Australia from Perth to Melbourne breaking the record set by Mr F.A White.

He travelled on his "Raleigh Racers" bike from Cue to Perth on the 1st September 1898, he remained in Perth to prepare for the long journey ahead ensured his bike was maintained and the tyres were in perfect condition. He departed on the 10th of October pursuing his dream of setting a new record. He set out on his gruelling journey, dealing with heavy head winds and nothing but dirt roads ahead. He often stopped at stations along the way for food, water and other necessities. Crossing the Nullarbor, with the little amount of food he could carry he resulted in having to endure 26 hours with no food.

Averaging 177km per day going against dust storms and rough roads it was a long difficult journey but he knew in the end it would be worth it, he was not fortunate to have a support team to back him up along the way but was often met by friends or people who knew he was coming to the checkpoints. On his travels from Perth to Melbourne Mr O'Dea sent back special messages to "The West Australian" informing them with details about his journey.

He stopped in at post offices along the way to verify his ride and kept a journal the whole way, he also kept a duplicate of his journal he sent after he arrived in Melbourne to a firm of tyre manufacturers who sponsored Mr O'Dea known as "Brown and Burley"

In just 23 days and 2535 miles Paddy O'Dea has completed his journey and made his dream a reality, riding from Cue to Perth then from Perth to Melbourne he broke the record and was declared a champion and a proud Cue representative. It was after Mr O'Dea completed his goal that he decided to live his life in Tasmania and remained there for 40 years, he then returned to Perth for a holiday and was so impressed with the states progress he decided to stay where he happily lived out the rest of his days.

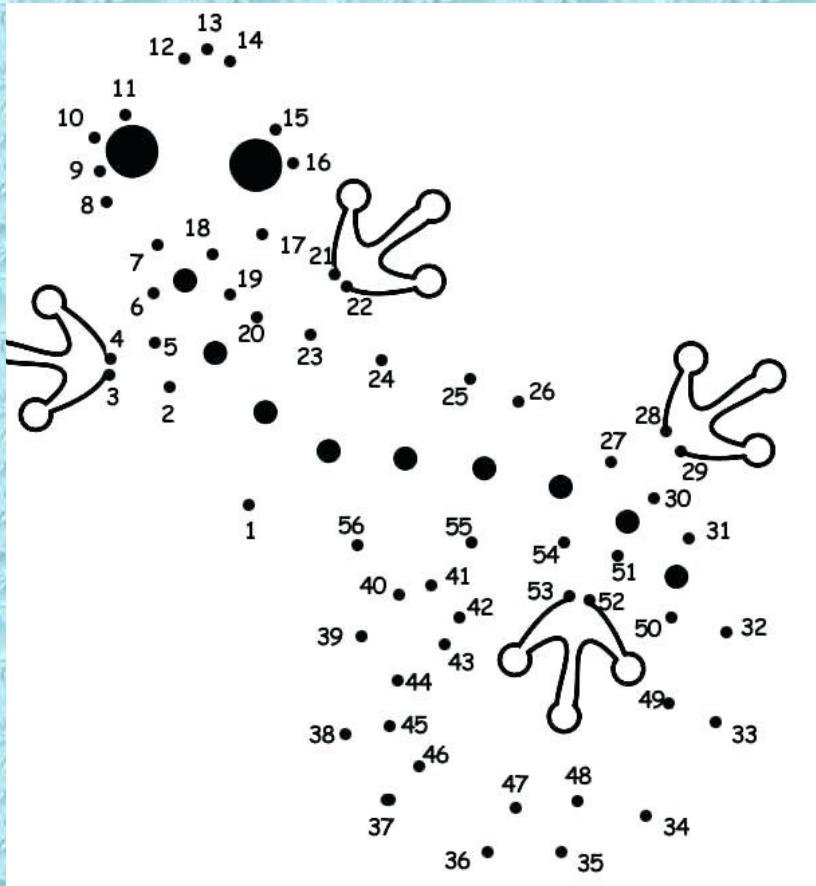

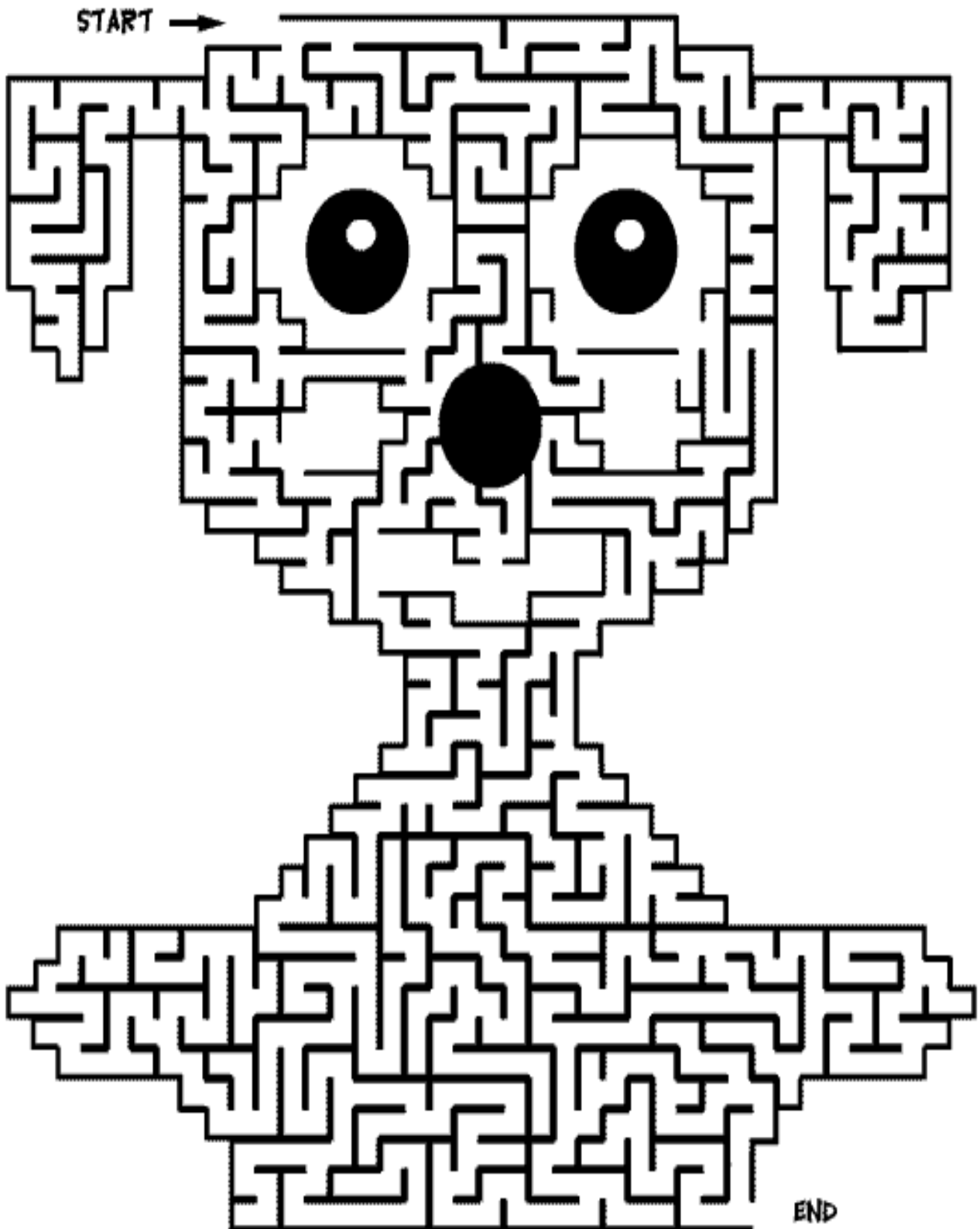
