Seven Golden Rules

for Prospecting



1.

Obtain a Miner's Right permit

when prospecting on vacant Crown land (\$25 from any Mining Registrar's office).

2.

Put safety first

- Make sure you have enough water, fuel, maps and first aid supplies.
- Give serious consideration to taking some form of telecommunications and a global positioning system to fix locations, and a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) – it may turn out to be your most important safety device.

3.

Obtain a 40E permit

prior to prospecting within an exploration tenement (if you don't have written permission from the tenement holder).

4.

Get written permission

from the tenement holder when prospecting on:

- a mining lease
- an exploration licence (if you don't have a 40E permit)
- a prospecting licence

5.

Comply with all legal requirements

when prospecting on a pastoral lease. You cannot prospect within 100 metres of any occupied building or within 400 metres of any livestock watering point without the consent of the pastoralist.

6.

Show respect when on Crown land

because it is used by other people or set aside for many purposes.

7.

Fill any holes

that you dug and repair ground that has been disturbed.

DID YOU KNOW ... that the maximum penalty for an individual prospecting illegally is \$150,000

FROM THE CEO

Having served my compulsory 14-day self-isolation period and returned a negative result to a test for COVID-19, I have been given a clean bill of health to return to work in the office. While I was in Launceston far longer than anticipated, I appreciated the extra time I was able to spend with my family while working from home. While it may seem that WA has seen the worst of the pandemic, events in the Eastern states demonstrate how fragile that feeling of security can be. This is no time for complacency and I urge everybody to continue taking health precautions to keep the community safe.

This month we welcome new Managers of Cue Tourist Park, Diane & Steve Wandmaker, to Cue. Diane & Steve have previously managed caravan parks in Queensland and until recently ran their own private camping grounds. They have packed up and headed North to avoid potential contact with COVID-19, crossing into WA at Kununurra, where they are completing a compulsory 14-day self-isolation period before finally heading to Cue.

Australian country music superstar, Adam Brand, and his family have arrived in Cue after also travelling from Queensland through the Northern Territory into WA. They will be serving the remainder of their self-isolation period in their self-contained motor home on a mining lease out of town, before joining their support crew at the Tourist Park to start their new venture. Follow Adam's progress on his *Road to Gold* series on his Facebook or YouTube pages.

By all accounts, the Steven Michael Foundation sports carnival was a great success, with football and cricket on the town oval for boys and girls. We are hoping this will become a regular event.



The refurbishment of the old Railway Station building, which is being restored and repurposed as a Youth and Community Centre with assistance from Lotterywest, is progressing steadily. As with any building of this age, issues have surfaced during the process which must be addressed before work can proceed, delaying the final completion date. Once the building is ready and fitted out with equipment, the Shire will be advertising for a part-time Youth Coordinator to provide after school, weekend and holiday programs.

At the July Council meeting, Councillors set rates for the 2020/21 financial year at the same level as 2019/20 in recognition of the economic impact of COVID-19 on the general community. As the State Government had increased the valuation of all mining tenements, the Shire reduced the rate in the dollar on this category to ensure that the increased valuation did not result in a corresponding increase in rates. Council has also adopted a financial hardship policy to support those ratepayers who may be experiencing difficulty paying their rates due to changed economic circumstances resulting from the pandemic.

If you have ever considered purchasing a block of land in Cue, now is the time to act. Development WA, formerly Landcorp, have reduced the price of residential lots in town by 33% to \$10,000. New flyers are currently being prepared detailing the lots available.

Barefoot bowls are now on at a new winter timeslot of 1pm on Sundays. Everybody is welcome, with plenty of bowls available for those who do not have their own. Come along to learn (it's not that challenging), meet new people and have some fun.

For those of you that don't know me I am Hon Robin Scott MLC. I was sworn in on 22 May 2017 as a Member of the Legislative Council of Western Australia, representing Mining and Pastoral Region for Pauline Hanson's One Nation.

I would like to start by saying for the past thirty years I have been interested in politics, and just like you I have been forced to vote at every election for the best of a bad bunch. Being a father of two and grandfather of six it motivated me to maximize my contribution as a parliamentarian. I'm here for the people of my electorate not the people of the house. - ✓ **Granted - License for an MRI Machine in Kalgoorlie-Boulder** -Alongside Senator Georgiou we secured the Medicare license for the MRI machine in June 2018 after leading a strong advocacy campaign alongside WA One Nation. Although our town is still waiting for the MRI Machine i reassure you that I will continue to ask the question and update my electorate as to when we can expect it to be operating.
- ✓ **Granted - Funding for Palliative Care** - I accomplished a desired result with obtaining a multi-million-dollar funding injection for Palliative care in regional WA. I was disappointed to hear that the government had again let our people down with in the health department and knew that people deserved to die with dignity.
- ✓ **Blocked Removal of Education components with School of the air** - I won the fight with members of the cross bench when the state government proposed that they wanted to remove critical education components with School.

- **Advocating the PHON plan to subsidise apprenticeships by 75% in the first year, 50% in the second year and 25% in the third year.**
- **Investigate unfair Native Title Claims**
- **Create Suitable accommodation in regional towns for remote community visitors.**
- **Continue to follow up on the current status of the MRI machine for the Kalgoorlie Health Campus.**
- **Begin the construction on the Kimberly Water Pipelines.**
- **Bring Royalties for Regions back to Regional WA.**
- **Continue to push for the Wiluna to Meekatharra road to be sealed.**

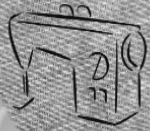

The Cue CRC is starting a group to sew for charity.

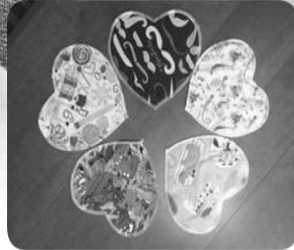

Rustic Bacon & Egg Pie

Ingredients

2 sheets shortcrust pastry,
thawed
4 middle bacon rashers
1 cup light sour cream
1 cup grated tasty cheese
275g amoroso tomatoes,
halved
6 eggs
100g rocket leaves

Directions

STEP 1.

Preheat oven to 200 degrees or 180 if fan forced. Place 2 trays in oven to heat up. Cook bacon on a heatproof plate in the microwave for 2 - 3 minutes.

STEP 2.

Remove trays from oven, spray with cooking oil and, working quickly, place pastry on tray, folding over edges to form a lip. For each pie, top with half the bacon, half sour cream, half the cheese and half the tomatoes. Make space to crack 3 eggs into, bake for 15 - 20 minutes, or until eggs are set and cheese is golden.



Easy Cheesecake Tarts

Ingredients

12 gingernut biscuits
250g cream cheese, softened
2 tbs icing sugar mixture
1/4 cup lemon curd
Strawberries, halved, to serve
1 gingernut bisuit, extra,
crushed

Directions

STEP 1.

Preheat oven to 180 degrees. Place 1 biscuit over each hole in a 12 hole patty pan tray. Bake for 4 minutes or until the biscuits soften slightly. Use clean tea towel to gently press the centre of each biscuit into the hole to make tart cases. Set aside in pan to cool slightly. Transfer to wire tray to cool completely.

STEP 2.

Meanwhile place the cream cheese in a medium bowl. Sift icing sugar over the cream cheese & stir to combine.

STEP 3.

Spoon cream cheese mix evenly among the tart cases. Top with crushed biscuit to serve.
