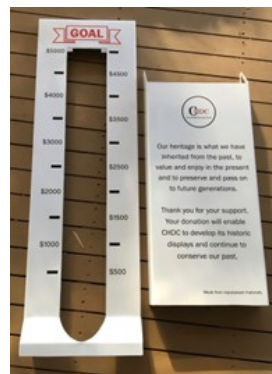
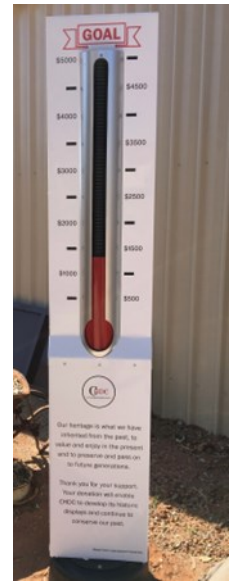

FROM THE CEO

It is quite a different tourist season to previous years with the tourist park having less returning visitors than usual. This has been offset by a higher number of short stay travellers passing through. We hope that visitors to Cue enjoy their stay here and experience the attractions of the region.

Some Shire roads are still awaiting repairs following damage caused by a rain event in late March. Road users are asked to take care when travelling, particularly at flood crossings. Please drive to the road conditions and observe any traffic directions.

Roadworks are ongoing 1km south of town on the Great Northern Highway. Westgold are modifying and improving the intersection where the Miners Pass Road meets the highway. Traffic management and reduced speed limits are in place. Travellers can expect minor delays.

A team from the Abandoned Mines Project are currently in Cue to undertake a ground survey of the area within one kilometre of the school and assess open mine shafts for rehabilitation. The Abandoned Mines Project is being undertaken by Department of Mines in conjunction with Gee Gie Consulting.

The Annual Electors Meeting was held in the Council Chambers on Tuesday 14 June to consider the 2020 – 2021 Annual Report and discuss general business. The minutes of the Annual Electors Meeting are available on the Shire of Cue website.

The Shire provided a night of entertainment with the Lisa Woodbrook Band at the Shire Hall on 11 June. Lisa and her band provided plenty of great live music to dance to and the Shire provided a light supper. There was a modest turn out with around twenty five people attending on the night and a good time was had by all.

Members of STORMCO (Service To Others Really Matters Company) are once again visiting Cue to present their school holiday programs from 4 to 8 July. The Kid's Club will be at the Shire Hall from 9.30am to 12.30pm, entry is free and snacks provided. The effort put in by this group over many years is outstanding and we thank them for visiting again this year.

WORKING HOLIDAY MAKER CAMPAIGN

Some of our local tourism and hospitality businesses have been thriving over the past two years with Western Australians wandering out yonder.

However, many businesses have also been impacted by worker shortages, particularly in the tourism and hospitality sector who typically rely on backpackers to fill seasonal jobs.

One of the McGowan Government's initiatives to address this issue is through offering incentives of up to \$2,100 for both Australian and overseas workers to work and holiday in regional WA, including in North West Central.

Incentives include:

- an accommodation allowance of \$40 per night, up to a maximum of 6 weeks for international Working Holiday Makers or 12 weeks for Australians
- a one-off allowance up to a maximum of \$500 to assist with travel costs.

There are currently advertising campaigns to attract working holiday makers in key markets, including the east coast of Australia, the UK, Germany, France, Japan and South Korea.

We have also launched the Western Australia jobs website that offers job seekers training, visa support, seasonal opportunities and information on regional destinations, including North West Central. POLICE BEAT

Hello Cue

Well its good to report we've had little crime over the past month and similarly not too many traffic offences being committed in and around Cue. We still do get the occasional bloody idiot who thinks 155kph with three kids across the back seat is a fair thing. Only one more kilometer over would have meant her car being seized for 28 days. Probably deserved it really.

Anyway, the tourist season is up and running and town has its normal numbers of travelers/prospectors here to make a fortune in Gold. Most though I suspect are really here to catch up with friends and enjoy the company in some good weather out of the cold. Who could blame you.

I did mention a few things last month about your own safety when you are actually out in the bush and how you can help us find you if it gets to that.

This month I'm on about is your safety before prospecting. I found a pamphlet about the Seven Golden Rules for Prospecting by the Dept of Mines. While it some very good info in it, it doesn't really go into rule No 1 too much but that's what's important to me and that all about your safety.

1 A - Consider your own health first. If you have recently had heart surgery two weeks ago, or dodgy knee's like a lot of us, or one leg or are deaf, maybe prospecting is not your gig. Maybe you need to stay in Cue with your friends where you will be a lot safer than alone in the bush in the cold and dark waiting or hoping someone will find you.

1 B – Have a think about the weather before you go. Heading out when its about to bucket down for the next three days is not smart. If your car gets stuck, it very likely that any car coming to recover you will not be able to get to you either. I won't risk my car being stuck for three days in the bush because of your bad planning. Please make sure your car is fit for purpose and mechanically sound so you can get back.

Tell someone where you are going (and go there, don't divert). I know everyone has a secret spot but surely you can trust one person to know where you are and how to get there. Discuss with that person what they should do if you don't return by a certain time. Calling the Police is not a plan, just part of it.

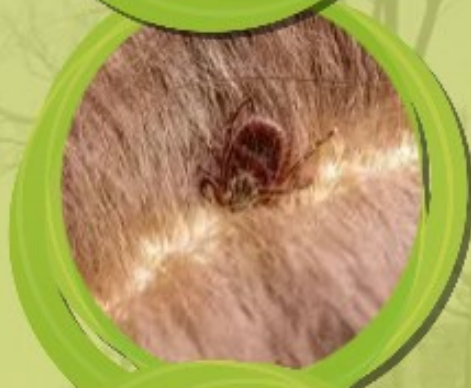

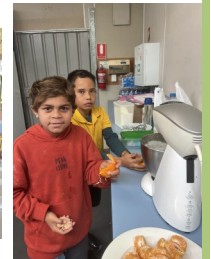
CUE PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

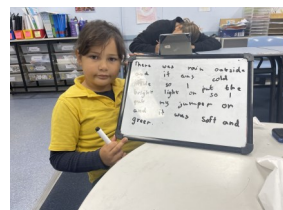
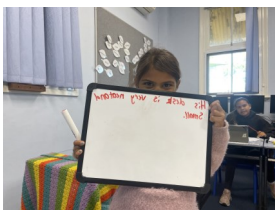
Thank you so very much to these companies and organisations for thinking of our students. So greatly appreciated.

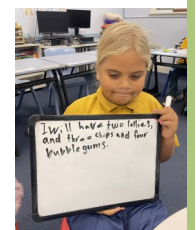
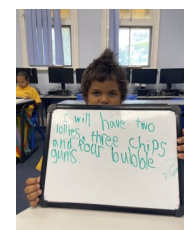

Falleena

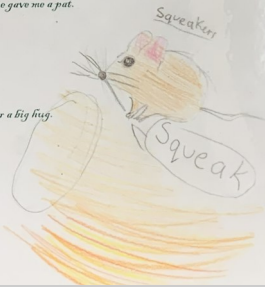
I found a little mouse so that Squeakers was her name.

And I saw Squeakers so I gave her a big hug.

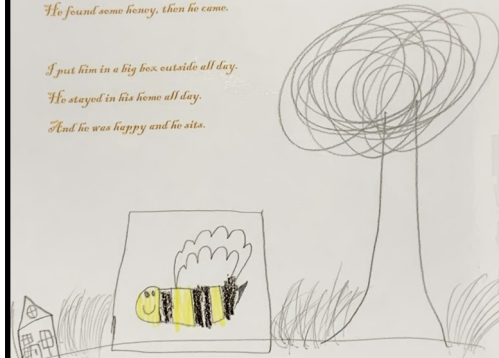


The Bee

She was in my room and was sleeping on my bed like pally.

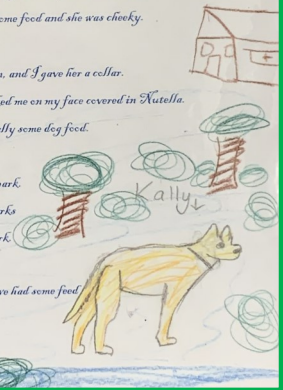
I put her in my room and I kept her all the day...
